


NW European IUSSI Newsletter: September 2020

Tales from the lab: Kate Parr (Uni Liverpool)



As is the case for most other labs, the appearance of COVID has put a real spanner in the works for research with closure of university & labs and cessation of fieldwork. The FunkyAnt Lab (<a href="http://funkyant.weebly.com/">http://funkyant.weebly.com/</a>) has been particularly affected because much of our fieldwork is conducted overseas. Trips to Ghana, Malaysia, Gabon and South Africa were abandoned and we must simply wait to see what next year brings.

However, lab PI Kate Parr, and PhD student, Alice Walker, were fortunate to squeeze in a fieldtrip to South Africa just before lockdown in both countries. Using a large -scale manipulative experiment we have been exploring how ants affect community structure and function in a lovely savanna site in the lowveld close to Kruger National Park. Alice was looking at the effects of ants on herbivory levels and the consequences for plants (sadly involved collecting more leaves and soil than ants on this occasion), while Kate, in collaboration with colleagues at the Universities of Oxford, Lancaster and Pretoria, was collecting preliminary plant sample data to determine how ants and termites may affect ecosystem productivity and nutrient cycling. We now have the rather difficult task of getting samples analysed and/or back to the UK with labs and airports closed – so watch this space...

In other news, the group will say goodbye in the coming months to Hannah Griffiths who has secured a lectureship at University of Bristol, while we will be welcoming back ex-lab member, Stephanie Law, next month. Steph will be identifying ants from a Leverhulme-funded community reassembly project in Malaysia.
